Alzheimer's is not a part of normal aging, but as you grow older the likelihood of developing Alzheimer's disease increases. One study, for example, found that annually there were two new diagnoses per 1,000 people ages 65 to 74, 11 new diagnoses per 1,000 people ages 75 to 84, and 37 new diagnoses per 1,000 people age 85 and older.
